Foreword

The period of some fifteen years covered by "Contemporary Sculpture: Selections from the Collection of The Museum of Modern Art" has been one of extraordinary vitality and innovation in the art of sculpture. It reflects, both here and abroad, a large number of methods, from traditional modeling and casting to the modes of assemblage, "soff"sculpture, minimalism, conceptualism, earthworks, and, more recently, making visible the process of the making. For recent sculpture, color has often been an important component. In another departure from the traditional, several artists have conceived and supervised commercial fabrications. Others have paid attention to technological innovations, and some to the more personal and expressive modes of the constructed.

A number of artists, in their involvement with the environment and the place, have created works that are outside the museum or the collecting situation. Simultaneously, other artists have produced indoor works, of impressive quality and impact, that simply demand spaces larger than any the Museum could possibly provide. Despite the absence of such works, this exhibition still is able to demonstrate the radical and often eccentric sensibility that has been an intrinsic part of recent time.

The emphasis on situation and place and the attempts to redefine the sculptural object have led recent sculptors to a virtual rejection of the figurative. Further, with today's open situation, the basic categorizations of painting, sculpture, architecture, theater, video, and publication have all been guestioned and all put to use by sculptors as they seek a new kind of human involvement both with the environment and with the work of art. For example, the pedestal has become almost obsolete, and sculpture exists on the horizontal, like a floor, or else on a wall, while reports on other sculptural activities may exist on film or videotape.

The Museum's collections have reflected the tendency of contemporary sculptors to create works in other mediums than sculpture, and a relevant selection of these accompanies the exhibition. On the other hand, because the Museum is committed to lending works to exhibitions both nationally and internationally, some major pieces of sculpture that would be expected to appear in a survey of this kind are not included in the installation.

Recently the Museum has had occasion to celebrate other aspects of its collections, for example, the holdings of specific historical artists and of specific historical movements. The collecting of the present, however, is a particular challenge, and this exhibition provides me with an opportunity to call attention to the efforts and energy of many colleagues in the Department of Painting and Sculpture who have made this aspect of the collection as rich and diverse as it is. The invaluable generosity of those who have donated works and of those who have contributed to purchase funds has made the contemporary collection unique and significant.

This exhibition allows us to evaluate the current collection, and to reflect on how it should grow. But most important, it allows us to perceive and value the excitement and creativity of our own time and place.

I wish to thank all those members of the Museum staff who have worked on this exhibition.


